## Proposal:

Gender & Sexuality Studies is an existing Academic Minor that is interdisciplinary in nature. It currently includes courses from the following departments: English (ENG 1773ID, 2150, 2160, 2170ID, 2180, 2190); African American Studies (AFR 2000); Social Science (ANTH 1103); Human Services (HEA 1100), and an Interdisciplinary Independent Study (IS9010). This proposal would add four additional existing courses from the following departments: African American Studies (AFR 2250-Black Women in Literature); Human Services (HEA 1108-Women's Health Issues, HUS 3630-Diversity and Intersectionality); and Humanities-Health Communication (COM 2406-Gender and Health Communication).

The programmatic learning outcomes of the Minor are as follows: Demonstrate a working knowledge of key concepts in gender and sexuality studies; Critically analyze, interpret, and communicate about one's complex subject position and social location in relation to gender and sexuality norms; Identify expectations, assumptions, and effects of social constructions of gender and sexuality, including an awareness of how gender, race, class, ethnicity, ability, and sexual orientation intersect and how these intersections influence constructions of human identity in historical, cultural, and geographic contexts; Demonstrate the ability to connect scholarly inquiry about gender and sexuality to technological and professional contexts. The proposed courses to be added to the Minor's list of electives already exist at the college and

already address at least one of the programmatic learning outcomes in their course descriptions and/or outlines (see Appendix B).

# Rationale:

This change would enable students enrolled in Gender & Sexuality Studies to have additional curricular options available in order to complete the Minor requirements and would enhance the interdisciplinary nature of the Minor. The proposed change would enable students to choose from 13 elective courses rather than the current 9 available courses. Not only will the additional courses increase the interdisciplinarity of the Minor, they also all explicitly address the programmatic learning outcomes of the Minor. Additional curricular options for students will support student success in the Minor and provide students with increased breadth and depth of knowledge.



Gender & Sexuality Studies Learning Outcomes:

### **AFR 2250: BLACK WOMEN IN LITERATURE**

Pathways: Individual and Society

### COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A survey course to examine a wide array of themes covered by Black women writers. Students will address questions of race, gender, sexuality and class. In addition, speeches/talks, slave narratives, essays, novels, poetry, short stories, and a play excerpt are used to examine the experiences of women of African descent from a range of backgrounds. Audio visual sources also help to underscore central themes for the course like equality, exploitation, girlhood, migration, motherhood, labor, power, nature, trauma, and love. The AFR year-long theme is Healing Spaces: Before and Beyond 1619. Students also use this theme to approach the required materials.

Credits: 3

Hours: 3 Class Hours, 0 Lab Hours

Prerequisite: ENG 1101

Writing Intensive

## **COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES**

Upon completion of AFR2250, students should be able to:

- 1) Use literature (both non-fiction and fiction) to trace and understand the experiences of Black women throughout the generations;
- 2) Recognize characteristics of African American literary history;
- 3) Identify the unique features of Black women's literature; and
- 4) Use Black feminist discourse to examine and critique race, gender, class, and sexuality.

### **COM 2406 Gender and Health Communication**

Hours and Credits for Lecture/lab: 3 credits (3 hours)

Course Pre-requisite: ENG1121 or higher PATHWAYS: U.S. Experience in its Diversity

Writing Intensive

COURSE/CATALOG DESCRIPTION: Gender-related health issues have always been the subjects of sensitive social, cultural, and political debates. This course explores current healthcare practices, experiences, and systems that are both affecting and affected by gender norms, performances, and representations. A critical review and analysis of the ways sexual minorities have been treated by health institutions in the major stages of human history are conducted in the class. Students learn the complex interplay among health, communication, and gender, with specific focus on how gender-based communication practices affect people's everyday decisions and choices in medical care, and on what we can do to improve the current healthcare system and environment.

### COURSE INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Understand, broadly and deeply, about the changing U.S. healthcare system, with a specific attention to the ways women and sexual minorities have been affected by the major healthcare policies and established medical procedures.
- Critically analyze the healthcare practices and medical treatments that are often labeled
  as normal and scientifically proven procedures for populations who usually do not
  identify themselves as the gendered others.
- Know how to communicate, properly, with individuals or groups holding different gender identities in various healthcare settings, as a doctor, patient, family member of the patient, healthcare personnel and administrator.
- Deliver clear, organized, and well-articulated individual presentations about genderthemed research projects.

### HEA 1108 - Women's Health Issues

Course Description: This course is a study of health concepts specific to women. Course content includes lifestyle behaviors, violence against women, sexuality and reproductive issues, fertility control, the older years, specific health and medical problems, the politics and economics of medical care, resources for prevention, self-help and treatment.

Credits: 3 Hours: 3

Prerequisities: EG 1101 or permission of the human services department.

Course Objectives Knowledge and Measurable Outcomes:

- 1. Understand and discuss the importance of studying women's health issues.
- 2. Understand and discuss issues specific to women's health.
- 3. Understand and discuss the lack of understanding by the medical profession towards women's health issues
- 4. Understand and discuss the politics and economics of women's health care.
- 5. Identify and assess resources for prevention, self-help and treatment
- 6. Understand and discuss contemporary physical, socioemotional, sexual, relational and mental health issues of women's lifestyles.
- 7. Understand and discuss communicable and chronic conditions related to women's health.
- 8. Understand and discuss transitions across the lifespan.

# **HUS 3630 - Diversity and Intersectionality**

3 cl hrs

Develops active respect towards differences in perspectives, experiences, values, and history within a critical framework for understanding mechanisms of oppression and structural forms of power and privilege. Examines the interconnections with groups who have a shared history of oppression. Emphasis is on marginalized groups, race and gender equity, and change strategies to promote social justice.

Prerequisites: More than 60 earned credits; and for non-Human Services majors only: Sociology 1101 or higher.

Pre- or corequisite: For Human Services majors: HUS 2405
